The IC's Youth Transition program

> is currently teaching life skills in 11 high schools, across four school districts in the **Colorado Springs** area.

New this year, our Veteran in Charge program empowered 47 veterans with disabilities to "take charge" and make their own decisions concerning health care. Our program is the largest of its kind in Colorado and is forecasted to keep expanding in 2017 and beyond.

Community Transitions is one of The Independence Center's 17 programs. The three employees who work in that area visit different skilled nursing facilities to help support people who have a desire to move into more Independent Living situations. This year's spotlight on a consumer is one such person, Charlene.

Charlene's Transition Story

Charlene was placed in a skilled nursing facility to recuperate from several health setbacks. It was never her intention or desire to stay in the facility. Shortly after she arrived, however, her husband died unexpectedly which made it impossible to return home without his support and assistance. Charlene's short stay turned into years of living somewhere she didn't want to be. The Community Transitions team worked with Charlene to develop transportation, medical equipment, and housing solutions so that Charlene could move into an apartment and live independently.

She took nutritional classes that The Independence Center offered, which helped her learn how to eat healthier. During this process, the Community Transitions team saw how Charlene was thriving in her new home and invited her to come work at The Independence Center as a peer mentor. Now she helps others experiencing similar situations find the joy of independent living. The Independence Center is so lucky to have Charlene as a valued and important part of our team.


Sources of Revenue Home Health (Primarily Medicaid) Independent Living 1 1 0 6


